A day to remember Dear Parents, Carers, Governors, Friends, Staff and Pupils

What memories our children will share when they grow up.

The joy of the Platinum Jubilee but followed so closely by the news of the death of Britain's longest reigning monarch and a reigning queen.

Coronations do not tend to come around very often and my mind has been working on how best we can mark this momentous event in our national history.

Coming so soon after our Platinum Jubilee celebrations demands even more creative thinking than normal, so here is the plan.

FRIDAY 5TH MAY 2023 INVITATION TO THE CORONATION

Children will receive a special envelope containing a card invitation to the coronation. On the card will be written their name and also, "who he or she is to be" e.g. The Right Hon Rishi Sunak Prime Minister, HRH Princess Royal, Sarah Mackenzie: Nurse, Chief Rabbi Ephraim Mirvis. HRH Willem-Alexander King of the Netherlands etc. The children will be encouraged to dress smartly for the occasion. Siblings will be paired up. The Hall, decorated with our Commonwealth Bunting, British Bunting and Royal Standards & Service Flags, will be set up with chairs marking out Westminster Abbey and seats will be named.

There will therefore be a seating plan and guests will arrive in order of seniority, i.e the VIPs last.

Props will be made in advance i.e. crown jewels, throne, Stone of Scone, altar etc.

The service will be fully scripted and key people such as the Archbishop of Canterbury will be chosen in advance. We will use our own hymns. After the ceremony the King and Queen Consort will leave first in "Royal Procession" followed by their guests. The King and Queen Consort will acknowledge their guests from the dias.

This will be followed by the **ROYAL GARDEN PARTY** accompanied by the film of the Queen's Coronation. First children will collect their **CORONATION LUNCH** including sandwiches, savouries, salad jewels and platters of coronation chicken offered in coronation boxes, from the hall. Mini platinum puddings will be served for dessert on the field. There will

be **MUSICAL ENTERTAINMENT and GAMES** on the field.

Children are encouraged to bring a picnic rug or blanket with them. Should it be wet, we will eat in our classrooms.

This will be followed by the **LOYAL TOAST** and the drinking of 'child friendly' champagne.

After a playtime we shall return to the hall for **A RIGHT ROYAL CELEBRATION** with fun, games, prizes, and mini films. There will be.a **free** raffle and prize draw throughout the assembly.



Green Mole Expanding the Humber Forest

You may have noticed that on Monday 6th March 2023 there was a flurry of planting on the site. It was led by Kayley Rankin, Tree and



Woodland Creation Officer with her team of community volunteers and our own green team members led by Mrs. Grainger. The fully funded project is part of the Humber Forest Scheme, which is part of the Northern Forest from Hull to Liverpool. Hedgerow saplings have been planted along our conservation area boundary and around the meadow areas by St. Leonard's Road. There were also some extra saplings for the copse. A total of 605 saplings were planted. On the 26th May 2023, volunteers prepared the entire meadow site for planting of wild flower seeds. These will be able to be enjoyed by the whole community. The clear demarkation of the meadow area will enable us to expand the meadow into the entire space, rather than three isolated plots.



Green Mole The Great Pumpkin Challenge 2023

Following the success of previous year's Pumpkin Challenges, every child is invited to plant a pumpkin seed again this year. Children will bring home a seed on Friday 28th April 2023.



Children are invited to plant the seed in a small pot on the window sill and care for it until it is strong enough to plant on.

It should then be planted straight into the garden. Pumpkins do not like being in pots, because they need to creep about.

Over the next few months we ask that this little seedling is watered, fed and encouraged in any way felt appropriate!

In October the children will be invited to bring in to school their heaviest pumpkin for a weigh in. Year 6 who will be by then Year 7, may also enter the competition, by bringing in their pumpkins prior to the Friday and collecting their pumpkins after school on judging day.

There will be a prize per class for the heaviest grown. These will be brought into the hall for the final weigh in to find the champion Pumpkin of the year.

The Great Pumpkin Weigh In will be on **Friday 27th October 2023.** Obviously the children will be able to take the pumpkins back home for making into soup or for a sculpture or both!

What's wrong with WhatsApp? Nothing if used properly

Sadly this is not always the case. I have every sympathy for parents and carers. You will no doubt have felt the pressure from your children, particularly in Y5 and Y6 to have their own mobile phone.

There are also many benefits. You can keep in contact, even track your children when they are out playing or journeying to and from school.

Social Media however was never designed for children. They are not mature enough or emotionally developed to cope with the consequences of it. Despite regular reminders and inputs from teachers and specialists in the field, the children forget themselves. I feel for them to be honest. As a society we have given them tools which they cannot deal with, BUT can if properly supervised by their parents and carers.

You will be astonished by the language the children can use and or read, but

frankly far worse is the meanness, sexist and even racist comments they make.

I feel at times like a failure, as 21 years of building and reinforcing our ethos and values seems to disappear once a phone is in the hand. The fact is however that the children **are** the delightful caring people we all know and love, but can easily lose their way in this virtual, unreal world, which quickly bites back and becomes very real indeed.

My advice is simple, as a parent you are the adult. Make it clear that if the child is to have a phone, you maintain responsibility and must and will check all that goes on in their online life. If a child attempts to stop your access, then confiscate the phone. If you think this is too strong, read on ...

Thankfully not one of our children but I know of **primary** children in the area groomed recently by a stranger and which led to sexualised images being shared by the stranger and by primary aged children.

School Direct places are available in well regarded Primary schools within the East

Riding. Trainees will also enjoy a contrasting school placement in one of our good or outstanding alliance schools. Our School Direct programmes have been designed to give the next generation of teachers the necessary skills to become an effective classroom practitioner.

On completion of training, trainees will be awarded a PGCE (Post Graduate Certificate of Education) with QTS (Qualified Teacher Status) which includes 60 credits towards Masters Level. TWO NEW INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS

... and we need you!

We are blessed to have a partnership of international schools. This began with our close and longstanding partnership with Südschule, Lemgo Germany. Since then this family has expanded to include Humboldtschule, Bremerhaven, students from which visited Year 5 and Year 6 in March. Students from Gimnazjum Grodzisk Wielkopolski, Poland, are regular visitors and of course we embraced Woodmansey CE Primary School into this family.

On 19th May 2023 we are planning something new and exciting for all the schools: a United Schools Climate Change Children's Conference. i.e. a live special assembly across all the schools, which will be hosted by Molescroft Primary School.

This is what the United Nations has to say on the subject:

"Education is key to addressing climate change. Education is a critical agent in addressing the issue of climate change. The UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) assigns responsibility to Parties of the Convention to undertake educational and public awareness campaigns on climate change, and to ensure public participation in programmes and information access on the issue."

The key U.N drivers for this are:

- Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts.
- End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture
- Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable
- Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns

Our response to this is by setting a challenge to all the children and families in our schools.

On the following page is the task challenge for the Easter Holiday. It's very straightforward and quick. The challenge will be for each family to submit an idea, which anyone can do, in order to have an impact on the climate, environment, energy use, use of resources or by reducing waste.

The individual impact may be small, but if done by many, then the difference can be massive.

We also have special prizes for the three chosen ideas which will be selected "anonymously" by a special panel.

The greatest prize is however to actually make a difference, to open the debate across three countries and beyond the classroom; to change individual behaviour and too change mind-sets and influence behaviour beyond our schools.

This conference will be filmed and shared on our websites and also through the media. There will be a choice of a top idea from each school to be recommended and collectively shared with the world!

At this conference the ideas will be voted on and the winning idea from each school will be shared around the world.

This could be the start of a really exciting annual programme with more schools joining in, united around the world in a global campaign.

TWO NEW INTERNATIONAL PROJECTs Advance Notice of our May Holiday initiative: 2. The Puzzle of Humanity

"We are like pieces in a jigsaw puzzle. We are all unique and we all have our special place in the puzzle of our universe.' There are no extra pieces in the universe. Everyone is here because he or she has a place to fill, and every piece must fit itself into the big jigsaw puzzle."

In 2001, UNESCO declared 21st May as UN World Day for Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development. This day offers the opportunity to celebrate the cultural diversity of people around us and find out more about what we have in common, rather than what separates us. Building on the success of the 'Hands of Friendship' project in 2020, children at Woodmansey CE Primary School, Molescroft Primary School and our partners in Lemgo, Bremerhaven and Poland will be given a jigsaw piece template. They will be asked to consider the cultural diversity of the people around



them, whether it be members of their family, in the local community or national figures. They can choose the figure which they see as being a positive model of humanity. They can present information as perhaps a montage of images with printed out words. I have chosen Bridlington's very own Rosie Jones who I have just discovered went to school with our own Mrs. Nicholls. These will then all be shared and open up class based debates on human and cultural diversity.

Children in Südschule, Lemgo are going to be doing this with staff from Molescroft and Woodmansey during or first return visit since Covid.

The project is designed to show that our differences help to build a brighter picture and we are united in celebrating diversity in our home countries. We wish to appreciate that our communities have benefited from and continue to develop through the migration and integration of diversity, culture and lifestyle of the people we embrace.

To also need to recognise the inequalities which have existed in our societies and still remain today.

Everything will be provided for the children including the jigsaw template (we all have to use the same one so that the pieces will fit together) and the cardboard. FUN IN THE SUN

Keep safe this summer

Just a reminder that it is recommended that pupils have a wide brimmed or foreign legion style hat which protects the neck. Pupils are also recommended to have sun cream at school but the following protocol must be observed.

The sun cream must be clearly labelled with the child's name.

The sun cream must be kept in the box provided in each class – NOT in book bags, coats or pockets.

may bring balls with them so that they can play games on the field. These can be footballs, netballs, basketballs, sponge balls or beach balls but no rugby, tennis or cricket balls or bats please.

Children bring them at their own risk. If they go over the fence they will have to sit until they are returned.

Ideally name the balls, however I can do this for the children if required.

Each child must be trained at home how to best apply his or her own sun cream. Teachers and supervisors cannot apply sun cream for your child unless there is a medical requirement, this being dealt with through the Administration of Medicines Policy.

Parents may consider applying a cream on their children which will last a full day, which clearly makes things easier at school, although last year there was some debate as to whether this was safe enough. I leave it to you to decide what you prefer.



School Meals are Excellent Value.

Our restaurant is open to adult guests at lunchtime. Meals cost £3.75 to be paid online. Numbers will be limited to 12 per day, but it is possible to book in advance. The latest booking is 9:30am each morning and guests should report to the reception at 11:50am. Children will come down to join guests at 11:55am. Please make sure your child(ren) know to come down to the hall. Adult guests cannot join us in the first week of the school year, on sporting tournament days during the Theatre Club week and prior to it or in the last week before the Christmas holiday.

A child's meal costs £2.75. (A full week offer of £11, £8.25 for a four day week.) It is excellent value, and by educating children away from a diet of crisps and processed food we are together building a lifetime of good eating habits and healthy hearts. **DINNERS MUST BE PREPAID**, no more than £2.75 will be accepted in arrears. **Dinners should ideally be paid for on line at School Money.**

Meals are advertised on the website and there is usually the salad with two wraps option and the Jacket Potato with a range of fillings. Children can self-serve salad, vegetables and fruit salad and can have second portions. Year 5&6 pupils may have a larger portion of the advertised main hot meal.

Crofty's Restaurant Around the World on a Plate

Continuing our International Journey of culinary delights "Around the World on a Plate" we have some specials, which our children can look forward to.

Fr 31st March Easter Special Dinner Roast chicken with stuffing and roast potatoes followed by Easter chocolate nest.

Tu 25th April. Italian Liberation Day Pasta Carbonara and garlic bread followed by Ice cream cake with fruit.

Fr 5th May Coronation Special including platters of coronation chicken. Sandwiches, savouries and salad jewels will be offered in coronation boxes. from the hall, mini platinum puddings on the field. **Tu 9th May Europe Day - featured country Ukraine.** "Chicken Kyiv" as in the original 1918 recipe

from the *"Continental Hotel in Kyiv"*, with crispy potatoes and *"Vareniks"*Ukrainian Dumpling samples. Followed by Honey Babka Cake.

Meals are advertised on the website and there is usually the salad with two wraps and jacket potato options. Children can self serve salad, vegetables and fruit salad, can have second portions and ask for more.

Meals served at Crofty's Restaurant, Breakfast Club and Afternoon Tea Club contain allergens. We follow good hygiene practices in our kitchen; however whilst a dish may not identify a specific allergen as an actual ingredient, due to the wide range of ingredients used in our kitchen, foods may be at risk of cross contamination by other ingredients. Anyone wishing to know the details of any allergens in any of our meals provided can get the information from the school kitchen. PARKING GOOD BEHAVIOUR Restrictions apply, virus or no virus, sun or rain.

I wish to remind drivers not to park or drop off in the cul-de-sac which dangerously mixes vehicles with hundreds of children entering or leaving the school. I also thank drivers for not parking on the yellow lines on St. Leonard's Road or on Molescroft Avenue, which keeps the view clear of the crossing patrol.

Furthermore, thanks are extended to those with disabled badges who park as far away as they find possible from the crossing patrol.

However, it only needs one car to cause a disruption. Please can I ask all parents to remind others e.g. grandparents, of the parking expectations.

Please remember that all these measures are designed to protect your children. A zero tolerance to infringement ensures that we keep the area safe. Turning a blind eye only ends up with the situations we see often on the news at other schools across the country.

MILK SHAKES & HOT CHOCOLATE


