## Forget Me Not Campaign Dear Parents, Carers, Governors, Friends, Staff and Pupils

Earlier this month, I announced this year's Charity Fundraising Appeal. The children have taken the cause straight to their hearts.

Molescroft pupils and their families have always been extremely generous in supporting the annual fundraising appeal. This however can also put unintended pressure on families. Our Charity campaign will continue, because at these times, the need is even greater, but the campaign is designed, like last year, to be "flexible" this year enabling pupils to engage in a variety of ways.

One of the lasting legacies from the pandemic was the combining of our enterprise programme with the charity fund raising. We are therefore to

keep this change again this year. We shall be making our products for sale and we hope to sell. They will not be specifically linked to any one child. There is therefore no pressure to buy any one child's product. We will, see the return of the charity fair, charity discos and busking. There will also be a special "Christmas Cinema".

The pupil council discussed the possible causes to support. Last year, we had a locally based campaign based on Viking FMs "Mission Christmas for children". The feeling this year was that we should still stay local but this time focusing on the elderly particularly in local care homes and those with dementia.

I was delighted to announce earlier this month, that we are partnering with the Alzheimer's Society and care homes in the area. Some of you may recall the rucksacks which we put together for homeless in Hull. We aim to create Christmas Baskets for those in care homes, particularly those suffering with Dementia, which is the biggest cause of death in the UK and can leave families devastated. Many of you will, like me,

have had personal experience of a loved one with dementia.

The baskets are to contain "little luxuries", a basket of sensory joy; softness and scent. In addition, money raised will be spent at the Alzheimers Charity Shop to purchase specific gifts designed for sufferers of Dementia. Examples include: Precious Petzzz, adorable dogs and cats (complete with sleeping basket) which "breathe". They are designed to offer comfort, reduce stress and offer reassurance. Tactile turns. are folding fabric soft rings, They are designed to help hands keep busy and relaxed, whilst providing comfort and soothing agitation.

We will work with care homes in Beverley Our TARGET is 400 baskets and £1000 for the Alzheimer's Society.

## REMINDER OF THE DETAILS

900,000 people are living with a dementia in Britain today, and millions more caring for their loved ones.

There were four jobs for the children to think about ahead of the Citizenship fortnight in November.

The first was for children to fill in a form, **if they would like**, to have a stall at the Charity Fair on Monday 20th November 2023 and/or busk on Friday 24th November 2023. The stall list was also published today, but more can be accommodated.

The second job was to begin discussions with their teachers about the products they could create on Enterprise Day and then sell and market. The products will need to be sold via the internet, the school shop and hopefully in other outlets and not linked to a specific child

The third job is to consider being involved in collecting items to make up the sensory baskets. Children can do this alone or with friends or siblings, or maybe as a family.

Items could include: shower gel, soap, room sprays, plug ins, potpourri, shaving gel, perfume, aftershave etc. Also, Christmas touches will be appreciated, e.g. a chocolate Santa.

Please remember that elderly people are male as well as female. Other comfort items, could include a scarf or warm socks,

As well as receiving these physical donations, we will use some of the money raised to purchase such items along with the specific items designed for dementia sufferers.

We shall have a collection day, MONDAY 11th

December 2023 for receiving any donations. This will give us two weeks to make up the baskets. The children will do this and include a card and message from the school.

There will be a big reveal at the final assembly to show the baskets and to announce how much money was raised in total. Please therefore send the slip below indicating the cost of the donations. You will see that it is anonymous and will be put in the class post box anonymously. It really doesn't matter if it is just one shower gel or maybe a few items collected one at a time over the next few week's shopping trips. It will all add up to give a little comfort to someone in a care home and particularly to those with dementia.

Any surplus funds will be donated to the Alzheimer's Society, minimum £1000.

In addition, we are aware that there are many lonely individuals living with dementia in the community. If anyone would like to suggest someone who would appreciate a basket, please contact Mr. Loncaster.

A fourth option is like last year. Some chose to organise their own sponsorship activities, under the supervision of parents. There is an optional sponsor form attached.

Money raised can be donated directly to the campaign or those engaging in a sponsored activity can choose to spend the money on items for the baskets.

No one should feel obliged to be involved in any of the activities. Activities like the Charity Fair and attending discos are designed to be supported by the children with some of their own pocket money. It is an opportunity for them to give to others in need, through a gift of a little cash, and/or of their time.

Gifts will be presented anonymously before the final assembly and there will be no checking of who has been involved or who has not. We will however share some inspirational stories and novel ideas.

The final assembly on Friday 22nd December will include the reveal of the baskets and the announcement of the total raised including through the gifts, sponsored activities and our final act ... come dressed as you like day.

Our walk to the school was past the newly planted wildflower meadow which had been sponsored by the Parish Council last year. Although most of the plants had gone over it was apparent that this had been an excellent display. British native whips, provided by the Woodland Trust, had been planted as a hedge on the public pathway side.

A well planted and maintained floral display welcomes everyone to the school entrance. The judges were warmly welcomed and watched a short video, together with some of the teachers who lead and inspire the pupils' ecological education. The video, accompanied by music, showed a year in the horticultural and wildlife projects of the whole school and had been very professionally produced by the Head, Michael Loncaster.

The school holds an Eco accredited status and this is evident not only throughout the displays within the building and grounds but in the whole ethos of the school. The enthusiasm and knowledge displayed by both staff and pupils was impressive and clearly deeply embedded within the curriculum. There are excellent links to the community who support the work of the school.

There is an annual floral display theme led by talented staff members and the theme for 2023 was to celebrate 100 years of Disney. This was undertaken by all year groups, each contributor having a half wine barrel with which to work. They individually and independently designed, painted, planted and maintained the barrels and their enthusiasm, dedication and skill was overwhelming. An amazing array and depth of knowledge for those age groups. The judges were asked to choose the top three barrels, but because of the quality of the displays and the accompanying thematic explanations for all twelve, it was felt that four category winners would be more appropriate and these were duly chosen.

A tour of the grounds which followed revealed an abundance of "right plant, right place" with biodiversity showing through everywhere. There were raised beds planted with edibles, bird boxes, insect hotels and a well-managed pond complete with water lilies, with a diverse insect and vertebrate life. All these areas provided additional educational opportunities and quiet spaces for pupils and displayed a clever use of space having a wide range of pollinators and native species.

From sowing seeds to potting up, planting out, weeding, watering and finally composting, the hole sequence of an understanding of the horticultural cycle was evident.

Space has been earmarked and the base laid for a new addition next year - a greenhouse, generously funded by parents. There are every signs this will be well used to extend the school's opportunities and activities. Finally, to sum up a most impressive, rare and unusual school environment where not only the health and welfare of the pupils is promoted and nurtured, but that of the world around them. The word "WOW" hardly does it justice.

We look forward to seeing:

- · Further development of the meadow. It would be great to see a plan for the ongoing maintenance of this.
- Completion of the woodland planting. A planting plan or sketch would help to visualise the full seasonal impact of this planting.

### LOVE IN A SHOEBOX -TO UKRAINE WITH LOVE

This is one of the most moving and engaging events in the school year. A simple idea which sends so much love round the world.

This year we are once again, working with Jacob's Well in Beverley to send Christmas Boxes to children in Ukraine.

For twenty two years we have sent, each year, around 420 boxes filled with small gifts to give to children all around the world. This year, we are once again asking for Christmas wrapped shoeboxes (the lid must be wrapped separately). Please refer to the flyer for what can and cannot go in the boxes.

The fact the the war continues in Ukraine, means there is a strong message we can send in 2023, that is the children of Ukraine are not forgotten. There are also sadly many children who have lost one or both parents through the devastating last two years. The power of receiving a gift from a child thousands of miles away is extremely powerful and often stays in the memory of the recipient for life.

As indicated in newsletters, I am well aware that there are needs in our own community. If families find it difficult to send a filled box, we will make up boxes of donated items, so please feel free to send any items which we could put in a box for a child to present.

We are contacting retailers for similar support. If you have any spare boxes, these will be gratefully received. If sending loose items we shall need them by 10th November 2023.

Thank you as always for your involvement. We are organising this collection to coincide with our Citizenship Fortnight. The shoeboxes are to be collected from school on Friday 24th November 2023. Last year, again more shoeboxes were sent from Molescroft School, than there are pupils. It was a truly remarkable sight. Extra leaflets are available from the school office.

The Jacob's Well Appeal is an aid charity, based in Beverley. Since 1984 Jacob's Well Appeal has been working in over 30 countries, including Afghanistan, Romania, Ghana, Burkina Faso, Pakistan, Philippines and Kenva. 

### **FLU VACCINES**

**Nasal Vaccines are administered** every year to primary school pupils.

We are aware that Vaccination UK are now writing to schools to prepare for flu vaccinations to be delivered this term. This time around, Vaccination UK are asking for contact details of parents and guardians, in their words to "contact non-returners" ahead of the session to reduce the number

of calls made on the day", as well as class lists of pupils.



The UK Health Security Agency guidance for schools for the latest round of vaccinations states that "schools should be providing this to the immunisation service in order to support the vaccine rollout. There are valid lawful bases for sharing this information; contact details and class lists will come under the "public task" condition, and medical information will be processed under the provision of healthcare and public health conditions".

Vaccination UK have produced a cover letter with a link to their privacy policy, which gives assurances on who the information will be shared with, how long it will be stored for and lawful basis for processing.

## MOBILE PHONES Our protocol

Although not encouraged I must accept that a number of parents wish their Y6 children to have a mobile phone available to and from school.

Year 6 children may bring a mobile phone to school, providing a parent/carer has completed the protocol agreeing to the following that has been discussed with their child. The slip is at the end of this newsletter and sent home as a hard copy:

- •Phones remain switched off throughout the site inside and outside.
- •Phones remain in the child's book or sports bag.
- •The school takes no responsibility for any phones brought on site.
- •Any child using their mobile phone on site will have it confiscated, to be collected from the school office by a parent/carer.
- •Any child found to be using their device for vexatious purposes at any time against another pupil or member of staff, will similarly have their phone confiscated to be collected from a member of the Senior Management Team by a parent/carer.
- •Any child in school with a mobile phone without an agreed protocol will have the phone confiscated to be collected from the school office by a parent/carer.

Any parent of a child in a younger class will need to write to the headteacher explaining why it is essential that the child brings a mobile phone to school.

Any other personal devices e.g. watches that connect to the internet are not to be brought to school.

Children in Y3, Y4, Y5 and Y6 can bring a change of clothing for their disco which will run after school from 3:30pm to 5pm. Admission for this after school event is just £2.50 and as above refreshments are available for purchase. Tickets are available on School Money.

## COVID The latest Advice

On the following two pages are posters from the UK Health Security Agency, which give straightforward advice.

The basic premise is that we are living in a world with covid just like we have with flu and pneumonia for decades. Like other respiratory illnesses, Covid can be unpleasant, but the chances of hospitalisation are hugely reduced, based on vaccination and general exposure to the virus.

You will notice on the following posters, that all respiratory illnesses including covid and flu are being treated the same.

We must presume that they are present in school, this is particularly the case as testing is no longer expected or to be requested.

Relying on the school to announce when there is a case would lead to a false sense of security, i.e. that "no news is good news". This is clearly not the case. Covid has certainly been around this month and most likely will be through the winter, but it hasn't spread anything like it did during the periods of restriction.

That said, conflicting information from Public Health now states **that if a child takes a covid test and tests positive,** the child "should try to stay at home for 3 days", for an adult it is 5 days.



## But no one is actually asked to take a test or required to do so!

## PARKING GOOD BEHAVIOUR

Restrictions apply, sun or rain.

I wish to remind drivers not to park or drop off in the cul-de-sac which dangerously mixes vehicles with hundreds of children entering or leaving the school. I also thank drivers for not parking on the yellow lines on St. Leonard's Road or on Molescroft Avenue, which keeps the view clear of the crossing patrol.

Furthermore, thanks are extended to those with disabled badges who park as far away as they find possible from the crossing patrol.

However, it only needs one car to cause a disruption. Please can I ask all parents to remind others e.g. grandparents, of the parking expectations.

Please remember that all these measures are designed to protect your children. A zero tolerance to infringement ensures that we keep the area safe. Turning a blind eye only ends up with the situations we see often on the news at other schools across the country.



I know, no-one likes waiting in the rain but parking regulations still apply when wet.

Our normal great parking etiquette went completely to pot in the rain this month. It was like every driver for himself!

I would prefer not to have to personally discuss issues with drivers.

As a relief Crossing Patrol Officer myself, I understand first hand how difficult it can become when cars are parked near the crossing patrol. The result is a reduction of visibility and often backing up of vehicles unable to move forward. On the vast majority of occasions however the road has been completely clear, even on a wet day.

I am sure everyone understands that those crossing must keep

moving swiftly past Mr. Platten and at a suitable distance. I also remind everyone not to cross behind him. It is actually quite a complex crossing and is hindered by those crossing behind the crossing patrol officer.

# Children and young people with symptoms



Children and young people can get respiratory infections a lot.

Symptoms can be caused by respiratory infections like:



- a cold
- COVID-19
- respiratory syncytial virus or RSV for short



Only a few children and young people get very poorly from respiratory infections.

Some children under 2 can be more unwell with RSV.



This can happen more if they were born too early or have a heart condition.

Children and young people should keep going to school or college if they can as this is good for their long-term health.

# What should children and young people do to keep others safe



Children and young people may have a sore throat or runny nose. They can still go to school if they feel well.



But if they have a high temperature or feel unwell, they should stay at home and away from other people, if they can.

They can go back to school, college or childcare when they feel better and don't have a high temperature.



Ask children and young people who are coughing and sneezing to:

- cover their mouth and nose with a tissue
- · wash their hands afterwards



Ask a doctor if you are worried about your child. This is very important if they are aged under 2.

### School Meals are Excellent Value.

Our restaurant is open to adult guests at lunchtime. Meals cost £3.90 to be paid online. Numbers will be limited to 12 per day, but it is possible to book in advance. The latest booking is 9:30am each morning and guests should report to the reception at 11:50am. Children will come down to join guests at 11:55am. Please make sure your child(ren) know to come down to the hall. Adult guests cannot join us in the first week of the school year, on sporting tournament days, during the Theatre Club week and prior to it or in the last week before the Christmas holiday.


## **KEVIN'S DIARY**It's a dog's life

## MOLESCROFT PARISH CENTRE Opportunities for community use.

As you know Molescroft Primary School is also a Parish Centre, which is rather unique. It is the only one in the county! This is because in 1975 when the school was built the local community through the Parish Council put in funding to have a large hall built and the additional parish room and kitchen. This was an amazing piece of foresight and has been to the benefit of school and community for 47 years. One big plus is the fact that the school hall can still hold the entire school population of 420 children plus staff. Originally the school was designed for just 75 children.

Following the Covid Pandemic however a number of users have not returned and so there is a great opportunity for individuals or organisations interested in hiring the premises.
