Dear Parents, Carers, Governors, Friends, Staff and Pupils A brand new Adventure Playground coming in April.

Most of you will be aware that our current adventure playground has been out of action since last July.

We have had further inspections since then to consider how we may be able to refurbish it, but it became clear that it had reached the end of its life and we had to think again.

Various companies submitted plans which were shared with the Governors, FOMS, teachers and most importantly the children.

The children were naturally the most critical stakeholders and requested modifications to one of the plans. The company providing this, duly obliged and the price went up accordingly.

The FOMS and I were acutely aware that £40 000, which is the majority of the cost is a massive amount to raise and in addition, that there is no way the school budget could stand such an amount in these difficult financial times. We were also aware that even if the FOMS could raise the money, by the time it had been accumulated, many children would have left.

I am delighted therefore to announce that the Local Authority has agreed to a loan agreement. This means that the adventure playground has been ordered and is due to be installed in late April 2024. This will mean that all the children in the school including our current Year 6 will get to enjoy this terrific installation.

It also means that the FOMS have agreed to raise £7500 a year for five years. We are so lucky to have the FOMS who are so dedicated to the school, the children and are willing to look into the future and make such a commitment.

Naturally this isn't possible without the support of our entire parent body. So thank you for every raffle ticket bought and still to be bought. Thank you for your attendance at a myriad of FOMS events and of course for enabling your children to participate in all the FOMS events organised for them.

The commitment for the next 5 years should not preclude the FOMS supporting the purchase of other

items as they often raise over the £7500 pa. However the commitment for the next 5 years relies on all of us.

Meanwhile, our donation chamber at Tesco in Beverley will open by the end of March. You can put your counters in the Molescroft slot at the exit. We are asking for support for a new greenhouse.

Thank you ALL for what you do. The Live Band Night was a great success on all fronts and the support for the Easter egg Raffle as strong as ever.

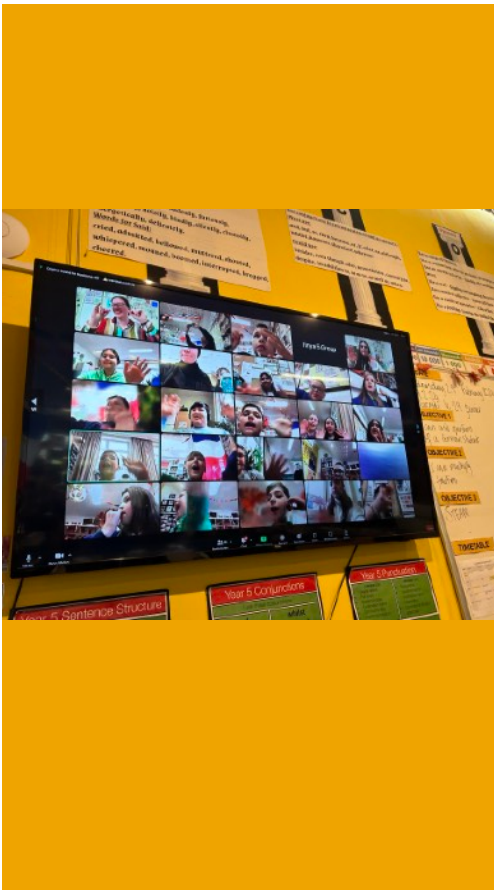
Over the next few months we ask that this little seedling is watered, fed and encouraged in any way felt appropriate!

FUN IN THE SUN Keep safe this summer

Just a reminder that it is recommended that pupils have a wide brimmed or foreign legion style hat which protects the neck. Pupils are also recommended to have sun cream at school but the following protocol must be observed.

The sun cream must be clearly labelled with the child's name.

The sun cream must be kept in the box provided in each class – NOT in book bags, coats or pockets.

It is important to have a school jumper or cardigan at school on Tuesday 30th April 2024, even if it is a hot day!

netballs, basketballs, sponge balls or beach balls but **no** rugby, tennis or cricket balls or bats please.

Children bring them at their own risk. If they go over the fence they will have to sit until they are returned.

Ideally name the balls, however I can do this for the children if required.

Each child must be trained at home how to best apply his or her own sun cream. Teachers and supervisors cannot apply sun cream for your child unless there is a medical requirement, this being dealt with through the Administration of Medicines Policy.

Parents may consider applying a cream on their children which will last a full day, which clearly makes things easier at school, although last year there was some debate as to whether this was safe enough. I leave it to you to decide what you prefer.

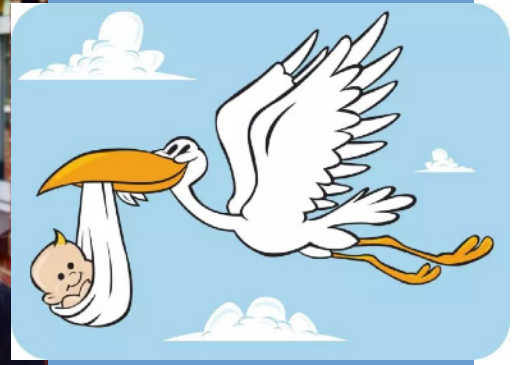

The link between attendance and attainment is clear:

In 2018/19, just 40% of persistently absent (PA) children in KS2 achieved expected KS2 standards, compared with 84% of pupils who were regular attenders. **Any child with below 90% attendance is reported as persistently absent (PA).**

But attendance is important for more than just attainment:

Regular school attendance can facilitate positive peer relationships, which is a protective factor for mental health and wellbeing.

PARKING GOOD BEHAVIOUR

Restrictions apply, sun or rain.

I wish to remind drivers not to park or drop off in the cul-de-sac which dangerously mixes vehicles with hundreds of children entering or leaving the school. Please remember that all these measures are designed to protect your children. A zero tolerance to infringement ensures that we keep the area safe. Turning a blind eye only ends up with the situations we see often on the news at other schools across the country.

School Meals are Excellent Value.

Our restaurant is open to adult guests at lunchtime. Meals cost £3.90 to be paid online. Numbers will be limited to 12 per day, but it is possible to book in advance. The latest booking is 9:30am each morning and guests should report to the reception at 11:50am. Children will come down to join guests at 11:55am. Please make sure your child(ren) know to come down to the hall. Adult guests cannot join us in the first week of the school year, on sporting tournament days, during the Theatre Club week and prior to it or in the last week before the Christmas holiday.

A child's meal costs £2.90. (A full week offer of £11.60, £8.70 for a four day week.) It is excellent value, and by educating children away from a diet of crisps and processed food we are together building a lifetime of good eating habits and healthy hearts. **DINNERS MUST BE PREPAID, no more than £2.90 will be accepted in arrears.** *Dinners should ideally be paid for on line at School Money.*

Meals are advertised on the website and there is usually the salad with two wraps option and the Jacket Potato with a range of fillings. Children can self-serve salad, vegetables and fruit salad and can have second portions. Year 4, 5 & 6 pupils may have a larger portion of the advertised main hot meal. Monday hot meals are meat free unless a special occasion.

Crofty's Restaurant Around the World on a Plate

Continuing our International Journey of culinary delights "Around the World on a Plate" we have some specials, which our children can look forward to.
